


















Good Works in Titus

Titus 1

Paul, a servant of God and an apostle of Jesus Christ, for the sake of the faith of God's elect and the knowledge of the truth that is in accordance with godliness, in the hope of eternal life that God, who never lies, promised before the ages began—in due time he revealed his word through the proclamation with which I have been entrusted by the command of God our Savior,

To Titus, my loyal child in the faith we share: Grace and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Savior.

I left you behind in Crete for this reason, so that you should put in order what remained to be done, and should appoint elders in every town, as I directed you: someone who is blameless, married only once, whose children are believers, not accused of debauchery and not rebellious. For a bishop, as God's steward, must be blameless; he must not be arrogant or quick-tempered or addicted to wine or violent or greedy for gain; but he must be hospitable, a lover of goodness, prudent, upright, devout, and self-controlled. He must have a firm grasp of the word that is trustworthy in accordance with the teaching, so that he may be able both to preach with sound doctrine and to refute those who contradict it.

There are also many rebellious people, idle talkers and deceivers, especially those of the circumcision; they must be silenced, since they are upsetting whole families by teaching for sordid gain what it is not right to teach. It was one of them, their very own prophet, who said,

"Cretans are always liars, vicious brutes, lazy gluttons."

That testimony is true. For this reason rebuke them sharply, so that they may become sound in the faith, not paying attention to Jewish myths or to commandments of those who reject the truth. To the pure all things are pure, but to the corrupt and unbelieving nothing is pure. Their very minds and consciences are corrupted. They profess to know God, but they deny him by their actions. They are detestable, disobedient, **unfit for any good work**.



Good Works in Titus

Titus 2

But as for you, teach what is consistent with sound doctrine. Tell the older men to be temperate, serious, prudent, and sound in faith, in love, and in endurance.

Likewise, tell the older women to be reverent in behavior, not to be slanderers or slaves to drink; they are to teach what is good, so that they may encourage the young women to love their husbands, to love their children, to be self-controlled, chaste, good managers of the household, kind, being submissive to their husbands, so that the word of God may not be discredited.

Likewise, urge the younger men to be self-controlled. Show yourself in all respects **a model of good works**, and in your teaching show integrity, gravity, and sound speech that cannot be censured; then any opponent will be put to shame, having nothing evil to say of us.

Tell slaves to be submissive to their masters and to give satisfaction in every respect; they are not to talk back, not to pilfer, but to show complete and perfect fidelity, so that in everything they may be an ornament to the doctrine of God our Savior.

For the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation to all, training us to renounce impiety and worldly passions, and in the present age to live lives that are self-controlled, upright, and godly, while we wait for the blessed hope and the manifestation of the glory of our great God and Savior, Jesus Christ. He it is who gave himself for us that he might redeem us from all iniquity and purify for himself a people of his own who are **zealous for good deeds**. Declare these things; exhort and reprove with all authority. Let no one look down on you.



Good Works in Titus

Titus 3


Remind them to be subject to rulers and authorities, to be obedient, to be **ready for every good work**, to speak evil of no one, to avoid quarreling, to be gentle, and to show every courtesy to everyone. For we ourselves were once foolish, disobedient, led astray, slaves to various passions and pleasures, passing our days in malice and envy, despicable, hating one another. But when the goodness and loving kindness of God our Savior appeared, he saved us, not because of any works of righteousness that we had done, but according to his mercy, through the water of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit. This Spirit he poured out on us richly through Jesus Christ our Savior, so that, having been justified by his grace, we might become heirs according to the hope of eternal life. The saying is sure.

I desire that you insist on these things, so that those who have come to believe in God may be careful to **devote themselves to good works**; these things are excellent and profitable to everyone. But avoid stupid controversies, genealogies, dissensions, and quarrels about the law, for they are unprofitable and worthless. After a first and second admonition, have nothing more to do with anyone who causes divisions, since you know that such a person is perverted and sinful, being self-condemned.

When I send Artemas to you, or Tychicus, do your best to come to me at Nicopolis, for I have decided to spend the winter there. Make every effort to send Zenas the lawyer and Apollos on their way, and see that they lack nothing. And let people learn to **devote themselves to good works** in order to meet urgent needs, so that they may not be unproductive.

All who are with me send greetings to you. Greet those who love us in the faith. Grace be with all of you.





Complex

"The problem becomes clear if we look at even the best-case minimum wage scenario — a full-time job with sick leave and other benefits, affordable and dependable transportation, and no child care expenses. After payroll deductions, about \$1,000 a month is left to budget. An average one-bedroom apartment with utilities will easily require \$700. A single parent needing two bedrooms will have to work, at minimum wage, 79 hours a week to afford the average \$740 rent for a two bedroom apartment in Ames."

Host Family Characteristics: Things we've learned


- Non-Authoritative




Capital Crossroads




MEDIAN HOUSEHOLD INCOME, CITY-LEVEL





TOTAL POVERTY (200% THRESHOLD), CITY-LEVEL





The federal poverty threshold for a family of four with two children was \$24,008 in 2014, the most recent year for which poverty data are available. For the purposes of this report, data regarding the percentage of individuals at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty level is utilized to provide additional insight regarding financial insecurity. While the 100 percent threshold of poverty is the official federal definition, the 200 percent figure identifies residents who may not be "poverty-stricken" but are not financially secure, meaning that they have trouble making ends meet and are at risk of falling into poverty if an unexpected expense arises.



NEIGHBORHOODS: BY THE

- Median household income is \$23,833
- 33% of the households are below the poverty level
- 34% of the population is under the age of 18
- 41% of residents under age 18 are below the poverty line
- 90% free & reduced lunch at area elementary schools
- 1 in 10 households are on public assistance
- 1 in 3 adults do not have a high school diploma
- 1 in 20 adults have a college degree
- 23% of residents speaks a foreign language at home
- 1 in 5 houses is in poor condition.

 Samantha is a recently divorced single mother. She has primary but shared custody of a four year old little girl, named Tabitha. Samantha lost the home she and her ex-husband purchased together to foreclosure. She was able to rent a new house, but only because she moved in with her high school friend Darren, who she is now dating. Darren is expected to help out with raising the little girl and to be in a father/husband role, but is a bit timid in this role, as he is worried to make a wrong decision, because he and Samantha have dated in the past and she had always broken it off with him.



Betty is single mother of two young boys, and has moved into a new school. While talking to a teacher at the school tells the teacher she feels like she cannot help with educating her children as she cannot read and cannot help with schoolwork. She also says he children will probably be late in attending school on the first day because the children do not have name brand clothes to wear to school, because she has no money and was recently fired from her job at State Fair. She will need to hold the children out of school until she gets her check from the state fair and she will not use "Boosters" to supply the name brand clothes. Boosters will get 10 outfits for \$200—No shoes.
