<sup>41</sup> So those who welcomed his message were baptized, and that day about three thousand persons were added. <sup>42</sup> They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers.

<sup>43</sup> Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. <sup>44</sup> All who believed were together and had all things in common; <sup>45</sup> they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds<sup>j</sup> to all, as any had need. <sup>46</sup> Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous<sup>1</sup> hearts, <sup>47</sup> praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved.









Four Keys:

- 1. They were dedicated to apostles teachings Kerygma and Didache 2. All things in common - a one mindedness together, daily and weekly 3. Breaking of bread - sharing of meals house to house 4. Prayer - a dedication to asking regularly for this work

The key was their "with glad and generous hearts"

- Glad joyful, rejoicing, very happy, grateful, celebration
- Generous giving greatly, sincere, simple

Antioch Manifesto, Concept 14 - Spontaneous Expansion

The churches expanded throughout the Roman empire in a spontaneous fashion, not according to a carefully detailed plan of man, but rather within the strategic intent of apostolic leaders who responded to open doors, under the circumstantial and sometimes interventional direction fo the Holy Spirit.

Expansion needs to be unique to every culture and historical situation, yet governed by the expansion principles in Acts.

Often, we setup our Western organizational control systems - denominations, schools, mission reliefs - we should be following the patterns in Acts and establishing the churches in the teachings, setting up leadership and letting them develop on their own and growing their network.





Preserving and Accelerating the Spontaneous Expansion of the Church

- 1. Identify where the Spirit is genuinely expanding His church and participate as needed.
- 2. Apostolic leaders, develop a flexible strategic intent as stewarded by our calling.
- 3. Leaders ensure that the churches are always thinking about expansion: ground the churches in the Kerygma and Didache
- appoint local leadership
- Instruct them to live and take the gospel to their friends, neighbors, family, work
