Framed by two prayers:


- Ephesians 1:15-23. Main idea: To be fully enlightened to truly know our calling and the power available to Christ and His church to accomplish God's purposes.

Psalms of **Orientation**

- Captures the things about God and his dealings that are constant and are the reason for blessing and stability in our lives
- Expresses the faith matters that are settled and trustworthy, the matters we can bank our lives on

Psalms of **Disorientation**

- Takes you through a journey of processing brokenness, heartache, injustice, disequilibrium
- Shows how God's people navigate through disorienting circumstances in light of God's character and larger purposes


Psalms of **New Orientation**


- Fresh experiences of God's goodness and power emerging out of disequilibrium
- Expressions of thanks for God's intervention that makes new life possible

A Proper Perspective on Psalms of Disorientation

"The problem with a hymnody that focuses on equilibrium, coherence, and symmetry (as in Chapter 2 on Psalms of Orientation) is that it may deceive and cover over. Life is not like that. Life is also savagely marked by disequilibrium, incoherence, and unrelieved asymmetry. . . . It is a curious fact that the church has, by and large, continued to sing songs of orientation in a world increasingly experienced as disoriented. That may be laudatory. It could be that such relentlessness is an act of bold defiance in which these psalms of order and reliability are flung in the face of the disorder.

. . . But at best, this is only partly true.

A Proper Perspective on Psalms of Disorientation

"It is my judgment that this action of the church is less an evangelical defiance guided by faith, and much more a frightened, numb denial and deception that does not want to acknowledge or experience the disorientation of life. The reason for such relentless affirmation of orientation seems to come, not from faith, but from the wishful optimism of our culture. Such a denial and cover-up, which I take it to be, is an odd inclination for passionate Bible users, given the large number of psalms that are songs of lament, protest, and complaint about the incoherence that is experienced in the world. At least it is clear that a church that goes on signing 'happy songs' in the face of raw reality is doing something very different from what the Bible itself does."

Psalms of New Orientation


"New orientation is not a return to the old stable orientation, for there is no such going back. . . . Rather, the speaker and community of faith are often surprised by grace, when there emerges in present life a new possibility that is inexplicable, wrought by the inscrutable power and goodness of God. That newness cannot be explained, predicted, or programmed. We do not know how such a newness happens any more that we know how a dead person is raised to life, how a leper is cleansed, or how a blind person can see."

Psalms of New Orientation

"All these prayers and songs speak of the intervening action of God to give life in a world where death seems to have the best and strongest way. The songs are not about the 'natural' outcome of trouble, but about the decisive transformation made possible by this God who causes new life where none seems possible."

Good Uses of Psalms

- Memorize verses that express great truths.
 Psalm 23:1 "The Lord is my shepherd."
- Sing praise and worship songs that use excerpts from Psalms.

Better Uses of Psalms

- Memorize entire psalms to help in times of need.
 Psalm 23 "The Lord is my shepherd . . ."
- Sing praise and worship songs that use entire psalms.
- Use psalms of each type (orientation, disorientation, new orientation).

Best Uses of Psalms

- Keep the author's style in mind.
- Keep the Book of Psalms in mind.
- Keep adjacent psalms in mind.
- Keep the new orientation in mind (whether you are using psalms of orientation, disorientation, or new orientation).

Psalm 145 Psalm 88 Psalm 23

- A psalm of praise. Of David.
- ¹I will exalt you, my God the King; I will praise your name for ever and ever.
- ² Every day I will praise you and extol your name for ever and ever.
- ³ Great is the LORD and most worthy of praise; his greatness no one can fathom.
- ⁴ One generation commends your works to another; they tell of your mighty acts.

- ⁵ They speak of the glorious splendor of your majesty
 - and I will meditate on your wonderful works.
- ⁶They tell of the power of your awesome works and I will proclaim your great deeds.
- ⁷They celebrate your abundant goodness and joyfully sing of your righteousness.
- ⁸ The LORD is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and rich in love.

- Keep the author's style in mind. Acrostic.
- Keep the Book of Psalms in mind. Leads the final set of psalms in the book. Follows the other 144 psalms!
- Keep adjacent psalms in mind. Psalm 146.
- Keep the new orientation in mind (whether you are using psalms of orientation, disorientation, or new orientation). Depends on how you use it.

- 1. Read it prayerfully.
- 2. Identify single lines that are meaningful to you.
- 3. Pray it as a group, alternating sides.
- 4. Pray it with a <u>New Orientation</u> in mind (going beyond mere statements of Orientation).

Psalm 145

Psalm 88

A song. A psalm of the Sons of Korah. For the director of music. According to *mahalath leannoth*. A *maskil* of Heman the Ezrahite.

- ¹ LORD, you are the God who saves me; day and night I cry out to you.
- ² May my prayer come before you; turn your ear to my cry.
- ³I am overwhelmed with troubles and my life draws near to death.
- I am like one without strength.

- ⁵I am set apart with the dead, like the slain who lie in the grave, whom you remember no more, who are cut off from your care.
- ⁶ You have put me in the lowest pit, in the darkest depths.
- ⁷ Your wrath lies heavily on me; you have overwhelmed me with all your waves.
- ⁸ You have taken from me my closest friends and have made me repulsive to them.
- I am confined and cannot escape;

- ⁹ my eyes are dim with grief.
- I call to you, LORD, every day;
 I spread out my hands to you.
- Do you show your wonders to the dead?
 Do their spirits rise up and praise you?
- ¹¹ Is your love declared in the grave, your faithfulness in Destruction?
- ¹² Are your wonders known in the place of darkness, or your righteous deeds in the land of oblivion?
- ¹³ But I cry to you for help, LORD; in the morning my prayer comes before you.

- ¹⁴ Why, LORD, do you reject me and hide your face from me?

- ¹ I will sing of the LORD's great love forever; with my mouth I will make your faithfulness known through all generations.
- ² I will declare that your love stands firm forever, that you have established your faithfulness in heaven itself.
- ³ You said, "I have made a covenant with my chosen one, I have sworn to David my servant,
- ⁴ 'I will establish your line forever and make your throne firm through all generations.'" . . .

Psalm 90 (start of Book 4)

A prayer of Moses the man of God.

- ¹ Lord, you have been our dwelling place throughout all generations.
- ² Before the mountains were born or you brought forth the whole world, from everlasting to everlasting you are God. . . .

- Keep the new orientation in mind (whether you are using psalms of orientation, disorientation, or new orientation). Depends on how you use it.
 - Listen with AIDS orphans (and/or your grief) in mind, but also with a knowledge of God and something of His greater plan (such as you get from Psalm 89 and 90).

- ² He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me beside quiet waters,
