Ephesians 4:11–16

¹¹So these were the gifts that he gave. Some were to be apostles, others prophets, others evangelists, and others pastors and teachers. ¹²Their job is to give God's people the equipment they need for their work of service, and so to build up the king's body. ¹³The purpose of this is that we should all reach unity in our belief and loyalty, and in knowing God's son. Then we shall reach the stature of the mature Man measured by the standards of the king's fullness. ¹⁴As a result, we won't be babies any longer! We won't be thrown this way and that on a stormy sea, blown about by every gust of teaching, by human tricksters, by their cunning and deceitful scheming. ¹⁵Instead, we must speak the truth in love, and so grow up in everything into him—that is, into the king, who is the head. ¹⁶He supplies the growth that the whole body needs, linked as it is and held together by every joint which supports it, with each member doing its own proper work. Then the body builds itself up in love. NT Wright

Colossians 1:28–29

²⁸ He is the one we are proclaiming. We are instructing everybody and teaching everybody in every kind of wisdom, so that we can present everybody grown up, complete, in the king. ²⁹ That's what I am working for, struggling with all his energy which is powerfully at work within NT Wright me.

²⁸ It is he whom we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone in all wisdom, so that we may present everyone mature in Christ.²⁹ For this I toil and struggle with all the energy that he powerfully inspires within me. NRSV

²⁷ The one thing I would stress is this: your public behavior must match up to the gospel of the king. That way, whether I do come and see you or whether I remain elsewhere, the news that I get about you will indicate that you are standing firm with a single spirit, struggling side by side with one united intent for the faith of the gospel,

³ I thank my God every time I think of you! ⁴ I always pray with joy, whenever I pray for you all, ⁵ because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now. ⁶ Of this I'm convinced: the one who began a good work in you will thoroughly complete it by the day of King Jesus.







Colossians 4:2–4, 7–8

² Devote yourselves to prayer; keep alert in it, with thanksgiving. ³ While you're about it, pray for us, too, that God will open in front of us a door for the word, so that we may speak of the mystery of the king – which is why I'm here in chains. ⁴ Pray that I may speak clearly about it. That's what I am duty-bound to do....⁷ Our dear brother Tychicus will tell you all my news. He is a faithful servant, indeed a fellow slave in the Lord.⁸ This is why I'm sending him to you—to let you know how things are with us, and to encourage your hearts.





Ephesians 1:18–22

¹⁸ Pray on every occasion in the spirit, with every type of prayer and intercession. You'll need to keep awake and alert for this, with all perseverance and intercession for all God's holy ones — ¹⁹ and also for me! Please pray that God will give me his words to speak when I open my mouth, so that I can make known, loud and clear, the secret truth of the gospel.²⁰ That, after all, is why I'm a chained-up ambassador! Pray that I may announce it boldly; that's what I'm duty-bound to do.²¹ It's important that you should know how things are with me, and what I'm up to; so our dear brother Tychicus will tell you about it. He is a loyal servant in the Lord. ²² I've sent him to you with this in mind, so that you may know how things are with us, and so that he may NT Wright encourage your hearts.

The People of Paul's Middle Letters

Ephesians: Paul, Tychicus, a loyal servant, and the churches of Ephesus

Philippians: Paul, Timothy I have no one else of his quality, Epaphroditus, your agent to me, Euodia and Syntyche, who have struggled alongside me, and Clement and the other colaborers, and the churches of Philippi

Colossians: Paul, Timothy, the family in Laodicea; Tychicus, Onesimus, one of your own number, Aristarchus, who was in jail with me sends his greetings, Mark, Barnabas's nephew—welcome him, Jesus Justus—these three the only fellow Jews among my colleagues; Epaphras, one of your own folk; the family in Laodicea and in Hierapolis; Luke, the beloved doctor, Demas, the family in Laodicea, and to Nympha and the church in her house, Archippus

Philemon: Paul, Timothy, Philemon, colleague and partner; Apphia, our sister, Archippus, comrade in arms, and the people who meet in their house; Onesimus, "Mr. Useful."; Epaphras, my fellow prisoner; Mark, Aristarchus, Demas, and Luke, my colleagues here.

Greet the Albanian team, especially Femi, who leads the churches of Kosovo, and Steve, who has faithfully served the churches of Albania and Kosovo for 18 years, and Holger, his colleague

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Paul's Expectations of His Churches Reflected in the Middle Letters

Paul had 3 main expectations of his churches reflected in his middle letters:
